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## **Preface**

This volume is the successor to Bill Griffiths' Collected Earlier Poems (1966-80), extending the account through the following decade. During the 1970s Griffiths had lived mainly in London, publishing much of his work through his own Pirate Press while also closely involved with Writers Forum and the Consortium of London Presses. The 1980s saw him move to Cowley, Middlesex, where he lived on a houseboat until its destruction in a welding-shop accident. There followed an itinerant period, spent partly on a caravan site at Brightlingsea, preceding his final move in 1990 to Seaham, County Durham. In the previous year he had founded a new imprint, Amra, initially publishing a backlog of poetry and prose. A distinct juncture appears in his work in 1991: once he had settled in Seaham the history, dialect and ethos of the north-east became his main focus. Griffiths was above all a poet alert to, inquisitive about and absorbed in his surroundings; in the later 1980s those had principally been his boat, the London waterways and the Thames estuary.

The earlier phase of his poetry was remarkable for the sheer quantity of work mostly published in short-run pamphlets which permitted frequent revisions and re-sequencing. The period 1981-86 shows a stark contrast: just three collections of new poems and relatively few magazine appearances. Most of the poems collected here were first published, and probably written, in the prolific years 1987-91 and practically all published by Writers Forum and Amra in very small editions. Many have not previously been reprinted and since this includes all the longer sequences, at least in intact form, there has been no widely available overview of the extraordinary compass of Griffiths' work in this decade.

The largely chronological order of poems in the collection for 1966-80 offered the soundest editorial approach to the textual mutability, interrelations and cross-reference of the 1970s pamphlets. A similar order was also an option for 1981-91, founded on the 'collected poems' which Griffiths assembled on digital files in 1991 and expanded in 1996. But since this would have dispersed the careful, coherent and self-contained gatherings evident in the pamphlets of this period it has seemed a preferable chronology to present the work as it appeared in those successive publications. Exceptions have been made to avoid repetition – *Quire Book*, for example, is reprinted here in its later appearance as Part 1 of *A Book of Legends*. In comparison with the earlier poems this 1980s work is textually stable although migrations and variations of passages persist, most notably in *The Book of the Boat, Morning Lands* and *Quire Book/A Book of Legends*, sequences sufficiently interrelated to need considering en bloc. Sections and excerpts

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from these and other longer poems were republished in revised versions, sometimes newly titled and without reference to their previous incarnations, in retrospective collections such as *Future Exiles* and *The Mud Fort*. Most appear here in their original form but readers will need to refer to the endnotes for significant variants and exceptions. The Amra miscellanies *North Scenes* and *Joanne's Book* (1992 and 1993) are included since they are entirely retrospective. A few poems dateable to 1991 but re-sequenced in later pamphlets have been held over for future collection.
